



In January 2025 two large urban wildfires swept through Los Angeles County simultaneously. This type of natural disaster is unprecedented based on both location and time of year. Thousands of homes, businesses, schools, houses of worship, and other structures were destroyed. Emergency response was challenging, the infrastructure was strained and, in some cases, sub-standard. Countless people's lives have been disrupted either directly or indirectly by the fires.

Along with other forms of philanthropy, companies stepped in with general relief support, and companies also stepped in to help their own employees impacted by the fires. Complicating this disaster, and different from so many wildfires, is that it occurred in a densely populated severely housing constrained region, the largest County and the 2nd largest City in the United States by population. While debris removal is happening, utilities are repaired, and some rebuilding has begun to take place, this is a complex situation with many stakeholders coming together, some with opposing thoughts on what the future should be in the rebuilt areas.

What will be both the near term and long-term economic impact on the region? With more frequent and stronger natural disasters, how can companies best help Los Angeles and also better prepare for large scale urban disasters?

The Department of Angels was born out of hundreds of conversations with community members, disaster experts, and survivors of the megafires. Since January 7, we've developed structures and programs that help residents impacted by the Eaton and Palisades fires gather trusted information and lift issues as a result of these urban firestorms. We learned that success or failure often turns on the capacity of community members to design and lead their own recovery. We will learn the results of a statistically significant survey conducted among residents of both wildfires in June 2025 as well as the latest rebuilding challenges and updates.

# 9:50 – 10:25 How Do We Rebuild? Building on Best Practices and Innovation

What will it take to build back these diverse and unique communities? Looking at other wildfires, we know that building back can take a decade or longer, and interim housing is sporadic. Can Los Angeles leverage new and innovative solutions to address this timeline? In addition, the challenges of Altadena, a community known for a higher percentage of Black-owned small business and single-family homes, offer even greater challenges to a population that traditionally lacks equal access to capital. Beyond that the number of Altadena homeowners over age 65 exceeded the national average, adding to the challenges of this increasingly vulnerable population.

### 10:40 - 11:10 The Economic Impacts

The Los Angeles wildfires in January 2025 resulted in significant economic, property, and employment losses, potentially the largest economic impact of any single wildfire in the nation's history. What impact will the January firestorms have on California's economy and how can that impact business operations? Moving forward what opportunities are there for companies to invest in the recovery and rebuilding efforts?

We know other disasters will hit. If you're operating a business in California, you need to take steps to improve the chances that your business operations and systems will still run after a natural disaster by planning for Business Continuity, Business Resiliency and Disaster Recovery. Consider the effects a natural disaster may have on your business, including infrastructure damage that might prevent employees from getting to work for days or weeks. Take steps to help protect your people and keep your business systems running in that scenario. This will improve your chances of maintaining revenue as well as operations during the region's recovery.
